KEY NOTE SPEAKER



Dr Grace Spence Green

Monday 17 June, 2pm, RCSI Desmond Auditorium

Grace Spence Green is a junior doctor working to challenge the narratives surrounding disability, medicine and identity. In 2018, aged 22 and a 4th year medical student, she sustained a spinal cord injury and is now a full-time wheelchair user. She is passionate about medicine, advocacy for the disabled community and challenging ableism, the stigma surrounding disability and inaccessible spaces.

She would love to see better and much more inclusive representation for disabled people in all walks of life and particularly in medicine and the media.

In the months of rehabilitation which followed her life-changing injury Grace learned that she didn't have to fit into the small and narrowly defined box into which society so often places disabled people. She has not only qualified as a doctor but will be running a pioneering course for 4th year medical students on medicine and disability; has returned to the climbing walls (she was a former UK U18 climbing Champion); travels widely and hopes in the future to work in the field of paediatrics, advocating for disabled children.

HEALTH PROFESSIONS EDUCATION CENTRE (HPEC) STRATEGY

1 September 2021 - 3- August 2026 Implementation of our five year plan

HPEC'S VISION

To support RCSI to be leading edge in its approach to teaching and learning and ensure it benefits from evidence-based curricula that are continuously improved and evaluated for the benefit of students, patients, staff and the international communities it serves.



HPEC'S MISSION

To develop and inform teaching and learning and to ensure education at RCSI meets the needs of our future healthcare professionals. HPEC seeks to facilitate the development of the educational culture to ensure there is a critical mass of staff with educational expertise to inform and improve our range of healthcare curricula and ensure our graduates are prepared for practice nationally and internationally.

GOAL 1: improve HPEC's visibility and status as a leader in the field

This year HPEC celebrates its tenth year, and this coincided with RCSI being the host to both the PGR conference called IDEA and the Irish Network of Healthcare Educators (INHED) conference – 'Building Relationships in Health Professions Education'. Both conferences attracted the largest audience since the Covid pandemic. Speakers included Professor Marco Antonio de Carvalho-Filho from University of Groningen, Dr Hamde Nazar from Newcastle University, Professor David Sklar from Arizona State University and Siobhan Freeney from Lobular Ireland representing the patient perspective. The largest number of presentations came from RCSI (students and staff) representing a broad range of research and educational innovations, simulations and evidence synthesis.

Health professions education (HPE) publications continue to grow in both number and quality and a recent analysis from the Insights and Planning Office identified that HPE publications form the second largest theme of publications at RCSI (the first theme is cancer). This clearly reflects the ongoing value RCSI places in education and educational research. Lastly, HPEC contributed to the CINNTE assessment with documents and staff input to a range of meetings. We have greater representation at a range of educational conferences giving plenary lectures, symposia, workshops, orals and poster, thus raising our visibility nationally and internationally including representation on various boards.

GOAL 2: Set up a consultancy service for RCSI staff

HPEC continues to offer consultancy on curriculum development, teaching and learning and educational research as well as educator career pathways and promotions, and this service continues to expand. HPEC staff visited Bahrain and Penang in 2023 and Dubai and Bahrain in 2024 to support all HPE work there. In 2023, HPEC also held 70 consultations with staff.

GOAL 3: Promote best practice in curricula development

HPEC has continued to support the implementation of the new undergraduate medicine curriculum. Professor Fiona Kent joined HPEC from Monash University and will provide curriculum and interprofessional learning expertise. In addition, HPEC team members continue to engage with colleagues, via our consultancy service, on questions in relation to approaches to curriculum design.

GOAL 4: Set up an Educational Hub

The HPEC Educational Hub continues to be a major success and delivered 20 online seminars on a range of teaching, learning and educational research topics in 2023. All seminars are recorded and available to staff and students via the RCSI Moodle platform. A new 2024 staff survey will identify new topics and training needs for the coming year.

GOAL 5: Promote evidence-based teaching and learning

HPEC continues to promote evidence-based teaching and learning at RCSI. In September 2023 the PGDipHPE Diploma was revised and informed by Universal Design for Learning principles, and the number of places was extended by offering 20 additional places to external fee-paying students. This change had led to HPEC creating its first income stream.

To-date, around 350 members of the RCSI community have achieved their teaching qualification through the programme, with a further cohort of 300 staff members taking part in peer observation of teaching. HPEC have submitted documentation to RCSI for an additional module to enable nurses to register as nurse tutors with the Nursing and Midwifery Board of Ireland. This will potentially increase the numbers on the post graduate diploma in health professions education in the coming years.

A new course called Essential Skills was developed and provides a basic introduction to teaching for cohorts of educators who require a just-in-time training solution, including participants from Ireland, Bahrain and Soochow University, China. On successful completion, participants to this course attain a certificate and 3 CPD points. Currently a similar course on Intercultural Education in healthcare for staff teaching international student cohorts is also being developed for late 2024.

GOAL 6: Develop digital teaching and learning capability

This year we developed a new online virtual bystander intervention in collaboration with the EDI team to coach staff and students on how best to respond to a negative incident as a bystander. A range of DEL (digitally engaged learning) workshops and seminars was offered for staff and students. HPEC staff collaborated with staff across Europe as part of an EU Squad on Artificial Intelligence in Education to produce a valuable AI report for educators. HPEC is also leading the AI in Education subcommittee of the Learning, Teaching and Assessment Committee to examine the implications of artificial intelligence for RCSI and develop guidance for teaching and assessment. We continue to support RCSI Online through design and development of a range of online programmes.

GOAL 7: Develop educational PGR community

There has been an expansion in the number of HPE PGR students and supervisors (three more students), with the expectation of further expansion to support the evaluation of THEP. New topics include: realist research on Case based Learning (CBL) cultural competency and widening participation. Research into assessment and Learning Communities is also planned for this year. In addition, three HPEC staff are due to complete their PhDs and will be taking on new research going forward. The PGR support group continue to meet regularly and attend the Educational Hub.

GOAL 8: Conduct educational research

Evaluation of CBL from both a staff and a student perspective following its introduction to year one medicine is being completed. Early findings are very positive overall and will be presented at the IEF. The HPEC PGDipHPE, the Educational Hub and the Consultancy Service, all support staff on how to approach educational research including how to get published.

GOAL 9: Develop a cross-faculty educational research group

This aim is targeted at bringing faculty together to achieve external grant income, that both drives up reputation and informs policy and practice nationally and internationally. We have now achieved two EU Erasmus Plus grants – one on developing a curriculum to support collaborative practice in the health and social care team called Teamcare and the other on the use of AI in the medical curriculum (RCSI grant €220k and €182k). Dublin hosted a kick off meeting for 12 EU partners for Teamcare in October. A further ERASMUS grant is being developed in conjunction with the SIM team. These grants bring together a range of colleagues from across RCSI to engage in collaborative research.

GOAL 10: Realise the potential of our cross-cultural and transnational campuses

We recognise that RCSI is in a unique position to conduct research exploring our curricula in different countries and cultures. This aim intends to facilitate research across our international student body and across our international campuses. A scoping review is in the final stages documenting four graduate types; and following a visit and piloting in Dublin, Bahrain and Penang, a questionnaire will go live this year asking 'are our medical graduates prepared for global medical practice?' Positive feedback could result in branding RCSI as the school that develops the global doctor. In addition, we are currently collaborating with RCSI Bahrain on a research project that explores the perceptions of staff and students in relation to artificial intelligence in education and healthcare.

RCSI Education Innovation Award

The RCSI Education Innovation Award was developed to recognise the importance of innovation in teaching and learning, as well as to promote and highlight examples of innovative educational practice in medicine and health sciences education. Furthermore, the introduction of this award aims to promote professional development of educators within RCSI.

Submissions in 2023 were selected for an oral presentation at the IEF (11 in total) and staff were further invited to present and share their innovations via the Educational Hub. The panellists, led by Professor Cantillon from Galway and President of INHED, selected the winner; this team presented videos of surgery for training in remote areas such as Africa. Professor Cantillon was particularly impressed as he assisted surgery in Africa and recognised the need and value of such an innovation.
